

GROUP TO PUBLICIZE F. B. I.'S INFORMERS

PHILADELPHIA, March 26 (Reuters)—The Citizens Commission to Investigate the F.B.I., which contends it stole documents from the agency's office in nearby Media, says it will soon make public lists of "F.B.I. informers and provocateurs."

In a communication received by mail today by a Philadelphia reporter, the commission said:

"In a few days we will contact a first group of these previously undercover agents and suggest they cease their repressive actions if they have not already done so.

"We will then inform those individuals and organizations against whom these agents were operating. Following that we will make the names of the first group of agents public."

The commission contends it stole 1,000 documents from the Federal Bureau of Investigation office in Media and distributed copies of them to newspapers and Congressmen. It says its purpose was to expose the surveillance by the F.B.I. over citizens.
